

ROBERT BLACK AND AGNES SOMMERVEL OF CROFTFOOT



The most notable Black was William, who, after beginning his literary career on the staff of the Glasgow Evening Citizen, migrated to London, and, as journalist and author of many novels, gained an immortal name as an exponent of Scottish life and scenery. Born in 1841 he was the grandson of Robert Black and Agnes Somervell.

MELODIES AND MEMORIES - PAGES 211-213

Robert, fifth Liltie-co-kee son, with his wife, Jane Sommerville, lived at Croftfoot. The sons were William, John, James, and one daughter named Martha. William's wife was Margaret Lithgow. They had four sons and three daughters. Robert, the eldest, farmed East Longridge, afterwards going to Milwaukee as a farmer. James became a Canadian farmer, having sons and daughters. One of the sons, James Lawson Black, became a pressman in Trenton, Nebraska. Thomas Porteous, second son of William, had as his wife, Helen, daughter of A. Bryce, Hen-nest. With a family of eight sons and three daughters, they lived at East Whitburn. Four sons became C. R. servants, passing from the lower to the higher grades, with much credit to themselves. William, the eldest, had nine sons and five daughters, several of the former being railwaymen. Alexander had two sons in railway service. Robert went long ago to Arkansas, served in the civil war, and has filled many public offices. He had many sons and daughters. Thomas went many years ago, as schoolmaster, to Forfarshire, having one son and two daughters. George has long served the C.R. Coy., being now District Superintendent at Aberdeen, having three sons and six daughters living. John, from a humble capacity, became Station auditor in the C. R. service.

John, second Croftfoot son, married to Janet Strathearn, was tailor in Harthill. There were eight children:- Robert, architect, Glasgow; John, of Bell & Black, match manufacturers, London -John Rankine Black, B.A., Barrister of Inner Temple, being son of last named John Black. William, a joiner, was third Harthill son; Elizabeth came next, then James, followed by Agnes, afterwards by Mary Strathearn, married to Hugh Reid, their descendants being now in Glasgow. The above lady died in 1904, aged eighty-three years. There was a son of John's named Thomas, regarding whom there are no particulars. Robert, a son of James mentioned above, with his family, lives in Glasgow, and possesses many facts, figures, and relics pertaining to his kindred, who, at home and abroad, have earned a goodly share of credit. Various other descendants of John, of Harthill, also have their abode in Glasgow.

James, second Croftfoot son, became tailor and clothier in Trongate, Glasgow. The most notable of his family of sons and daughters was William, who, after beginning his literary career on the staff of the Glasgow Evening Citizen, migrated to London, and, as journalist and author of many novels, gained an immortal name as an exponent of Scottish life and scenery. In our own country and in many other countries his books have a deservedly enthusiastic popularity, and are, because of their truth and purity, likely to be always regarded with favour. "A Daughter of Heth," "Madcap Violet," "A Princess of Thule," "Far Lochaber," and "Macleod of Dare," are worthy examples of his literary talent. William Black was a prolific writer, and altogether wrote more than thirty volumes. He died in December 1898, aged fifty-seven years.

Reminder: * as JB didn't mention this individual, their story ends in the table whereas ^ tells you there is another generation within this document.

The accompanying tree however might show several more generations than is in this narrative.

Residence - Croftfoot, Whitburn, West Lothian

Robert, fifth Liltie-co-kee son, with his wife, **Jane [Agnes] Somervell**, lived at Croftfoot. The sons were William, John, James, and one daughter named Martha.

ROBERT BLACK

Robert is the only child of William Black and Mary Tod that no baptism can be found. It is estimated he was born around 1739 at either Liltie-co-kee or Cleughhead. He seems averse to church records (but not religion!) as we can find very few documents for this family.

AGNES SOMMERVEL

Robert's wife was Agnes, not Jane, as stated by JB. Her most likely baptism has been identified as 30 November 1747 in Carnwath to parents James Sommervel and Marion Muir but we caution that the marriage proclamation stated she was from Carstairs. An extract that follows states she was fluent in French and taught her children the language.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

Robert was 28 when he married Agnes on 23 August 1767. His younger brother had married two weeks before him.

No records were found for the birth of their four known children, so the years have been estimated from census records where possible. The only known daughter, Martha, was specifically named by JB but we have no further knowledge about her.

Croftfoot is today a privately owned wood, open to the public.

As Robert and Agnes's grandson became an important Scottish writer, the following was written about the upbringing of James, their youngest son. It gives a valuable insight into life at Croftfoot and possibly reflects the upbringing 'enjoyed' by all the Blacks of Breich Water.

Although his [James] schooling had been no better than that usually enjoyed by the son of a small farmer, he had educated himself so soil, and they should be deported to a foreign country! The elder that he could read the Greek Testament and had even some knowledge of Hebrew. French he had been taught as a boy on the lonely farm at Carnwath Moor, for his mother, with a provident care for the future unusual even in Scotland, had caused all her children to be taught French in case Napoleon's invading army should find footing on British Black's religion was deeply tinctured with the melancholy of his race and sect. He had the Puritan's dread of many forms of pleasure that now seem innocent enough, and the world in which his son was destined to play his part seemed to him to be a place of darkness and sin. If the 'pleasures' denied to the Black children were innocent enough at the time this was written, we wonder what these activities were that were frowned on by Robert.

DEATH AND BURIAL

No burial was found for Robert and for that reason we have recorded his burial conservatively as 'after 1785'; the date reflects the birth of their youngest child. For Agnes, to teach her children French, she must have lived longer, and we have extended the date to 'after 1800'.

SECOND GENERATION

WILLIAM BLACK AND MARGARET LITHGOW

Residence - Croftfoot, Whitburn, Lanark East Longridge Whitburn, West Lothian

William's wife was **Margaret Lithgow**. They had four sons and three daughters. Robert, James... Thomas Porteous

WILLIAM BLACK

William we estimate was born around 1769 at Croftfoot, Whitburn.

MARGARET LITHGOW

From her age at death, Margaret was born in 1777. As she gave Lawson and Porteous as middle names to her children, we looked to these as possibilities for her mother's name but none were obvious.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

William married Margaret Lithgow circa 1806 so this would mean William was around 37 and Margaret 29. *Melodies and Memories* stated the couple had four sons but named only three. The missing son proved to be William. The three daughters were also unnamed and we have identified only two. Based on census records the family lived in Whitburn, possibly East Longridge as suggested by JB.

¹JB is confusing at times. It was decided that James Lawson Black, the pressman in Trenton Nebraska, was probably the son of James the Canadian Farmer.

DEATH AND BURIAL

William was buried around the age of 60 in Whitburn on 6 April 1829; Margaret's death was recorded at the age of 62 on 11 October 1839 in Glasgow. William Black was named as her deceased husband.

JOHN BLACK AND JANET STRATHEARN

Residence - Harthill, Shotts, Lanark

John, second Croftfoot son, married to **Janet Strathearn**, was a tailor in Harthill. There were eight children: Robert... John... William... Elizabeth... James... Agnes... Mary Strathearn... Thomas.

JOHN BLACK


John was born about 1778 at Croftfoot, Whitburn. He was a tailor who lived all his married life in Harthill, a small village only a few miles from Whitburn, but lying in the parish of Shotts.

JANET STRATHEARN

Janet was baptised in Shotts on 6 October 1776 to parents John Stratherne and Elisabeth Clark. Again, spellings vary.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

John and Janet married on 21 December 1799 in Cambusnethan but the banns were also read in Shotts. Perhaps John undertook an apprenticeship in Cambusnethan for the marriage to be proclaimed there.

Several of John and Janet's eight children had remarkable achievements and these are noted later. JB named all of their children correctly.



The Shotts records show Janet died in March 1850 at the age of 74.

By 1851 the eldest daughter Elizabeth had returned to live with her father. She had been widowed two years earlier. Mary the youngest was still unmarried and living at home.

DEATH AND BURIAL

John died on 1 February 1865 at the age of 87. The informant was his son-in-law William Pate, also described as a neighbour.

JAMES BLACK, CATHERINE LEVIES AND CAROLINE CONNING

Residence - Trongate, Glasgow

James, second [third] Croftfoot son, became a tailor and clothier in Trongate, Glasgow. The most notable of his family of sons and daughters was William....

JB erred when recording James as he was actually the third Croftfoot son. He was born around 1785 and like his brother John, he too was a tailor but he had moved to Glasgow before he married. Perhaps he was escaping his father's 'Puritan's dread of many forms of pleasure' as mentioned by his son's biographer. Cathcart is now included in Glasgow city but would have been of more rural in nature then. *Melodies and Memories* mentioned James's son William the novelist but failed to record the names of James's two wives and his many other children, but then again, tragically nearly all of them died young.

KATHERINE LEVIES

The marriage records indicate Katherine was a Levies (as opposed to a Lewis or Lavis) from Carluke so although no birth was found for her around 1787, we suspect her parents were James Levies and Margaret Steven, as a James Levies was born to this couple in Carluke in 1794. Birth records of Catherine's children and grandchildren give several variations of this surname.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

James and Katherine married on 10 August 1811 at Cathcart when James was 26.

James's death certificate tells a terrible tale of this family, as of the eleven children born to James and Katherine only two outlived their father (Robert and James). Rhesus negative is a layman's diagnosis for this family's tragedies but realistically this is just a wild guess. The certificate is shown below but it is very difficult to read as the death years are obscured and other supporting records are missing or incomplete.

CAROLINE CONNING

By 1835 Katherine had died and James, at the age of 51, married Caroline Conning a 27-year-old English born woman, on 31 January 1836. We are not sure of her parentage.³

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³ In 1841 there were several Conning families living in Whitehorn, Wigtown, and the only Conning in Glasgow was a 70-year-old saddler James Conning. This is likely Caroline's father. In 1871 a Caroline Black, born in England, of the right age was visiting a family in Whitehorn.

By 1851 all the surviving children from his first marriage had left home and the last two of James's second family had been born. The family were living at 22 Trongate Street. James was described as a master tailor, employing four men. Because of the fame of his son we know much more about James's character than other members of the family.

[William's] father James Black was a gentle and studious person fond of books and devoted in the quiet undemonstrative Scotch fashion to his children of whom William was one of the younger. The eldest was a boy named James while between him and William came a sister [Wilhelmina] whose character in the coming years was to be drawn for the outer world by Black himself in the person of Queen Tita. The eldest son James died nearly twenty years before his more distinguished brother but some traits of his character were preserved by Black in his portrait of James Drummond the hero of Madcap Violet. DEATH AND BURIAL

James died in 1855 at the age of 70. For one year only, this very full death format was used, so the tragedy of this family's births and deaths (although difficult to read) are listed.

James was buried in the North Street Cemetery, Anderston; all the bodies in this cemetery have now been reinterred elsewhere.

It was in 1855, when Black was barely fourteen that his father died. I have briefly stated what manner of man he was. He never gained even moderate wealth - was never what the world calls successful. But he was one of those fortunate men who can enjoy life on very humble means, and enjoy it at least as fully as those with whom fortune has seemingly dealt more kindly. He was never tired of impressing upon his children the fact that all the really good things of life, all the essentials of happiness, are just as freely open to the poor as to the rich. He had an intense love of nature, and delighted to escape from the crowded streets of Glasgow into the country, where he would seek out some favorite spot and quietly study its beauties with observant eyes. Often his children, when they accompanied him in his country walks, saw him, as he gazed on some scene that satisfied his eye, reverently uncover his head, and they knew that he was giving thanks for the beauty that had thus been revealed to him. His love of nature, and his power of observing all natural objects closely, he bequeathed to his son William. Although his schooling had been no better than that usually enjoyed by the son of a small farmer, he had educated himself so that he could read the Greek Testament, and had even some knowledge of Hebrew. French he had been taught as a boy on the lonely farm at Carnwath Moor, for his mother, with a provident care for the future unusual even in Scotland, had caused all her children to be taught French - in case Napoleon's invading army should find footing on British soil, and they should be deported to a foreign country! The elder Black's religion was deeply tinctured with the melancholy of his race and sect. He had the Puritan's dread of many forms of pleasure that now seem innocent enough, and the world in which his son was destined to play his part seemed to him to be a place of darkness and sin. In literature his tastes were characteristic of the man. He did not positively forbid his children to read fiction, but the only novels he permitted in his house were Scott's, and even these were only tolerated as a special favor. There was little, therefore, in Black's home in his early days to smooth the way to his future calling. William Black, Novelist: A Biography Wemyss Reid

On his death, a notice to debtors and creditors was placed in the press.

Robert Black was James's son; they had the same occupation, but obviously worked apart.

After James's death, the family moved to a new home and took in boarders. The two Lawson women were not daughters of James Black as transcribed by *Ancestry*.

Caroline, needless to say, survived her husband by many years and later went to live in England with her son William the novelist.

Mrs Black the mother of the novelist survived her husband for many years and lived to see her son William at the height of his fame and in the fullest enjoyment of his prosperity Like her husband she was a devoted parent and very proud of the talents of her son It was delightful later in life to hear her talk of the novelist to congenial friends who shared her admiration for him. Transplanted from Glasgow to London where she found herself amid strange surroundings she clung naturally to those who had associations with her old home or with similar scenes. But her deep affection for her son enabled her to hold her own in the society of men of letters to which she was introduced through him. Many can remember the fine old Scots lady whose pride in

her boy never betrayed itself in any fashion that jarred upon those around her and whose shrewdness of judgment led her to select unerringly among the many strangers with whom she was brought in contact the men and women who were most worthy of her friendship. Her mingled simplicity and quickness was a fair indication of the atmosphere of the home in which William Black spent his boyhood. **William Black**, **Novelist: A Biography Wemyss Reid**

According to one census, Caroline was not 'Scots' and she died in Camberwell in the June quarter of 1878. Her burial place is unknown.

THIRD GENERATION

CHILDREN OF WILLIAM BLACK AND MARGARET LITHGOW

ROBERT BLACK AND JANET L UNKNOWN

Residence - East Longridge, West Lothian Lisbon, Waukesha, Wisconsin, USA

Robert, the eldest, farmed East Longridge, afterwards going to Milwaukee as a farmer.

ROBERT BLACK

Robert was born around 1807 in Whitburn and indeed, exactly as written, Robert was found on the 1841 census as a farmer at East Longridge. He lowered his age as required to 30 and also living in the household was a male and female servant. The following year he was living in America and probably married.

JANET L UNKNOWN

All we know is that Janet or Jannette or Jenette was born around 1814 in Scotland.⁴

MARRIAGE

No marriage was found for Robert in Scotland between 1841 and June 1842 when he sailed to New York. In 1848 he was naturalised as an American citizen.

⁴ Robert's servant in 1841 was Jane Bishop. We can't locate what happened to her so she may be the 'Janet' in Wisconsin.

On the 1850 census Robert was living at Lisbon, Waukesha, Wisconsin aged 44, born in Scotland along with Janet L Black aged 36, born in Scotland and Charles H Black aged 14, born in England. This last person is a mystery also.

By 1855 it must have been evident to Robert that he and Janet were to remain childless and we believe he wrote to his younger brother Thomas Porteous Black, offering to pay the fare for one of his sons to come and work for him and be his 'heir'. As a result Thomas's thirteen year old son, also named Robert, travelled to Wisconsin in 1855. The 1860 Census (01 June 1860) from Lisbon, Waukesha, Wisconsin, records:

AGNES BLACK

Agnes was one of the unnamed daughters mentioned by JB. Although the 1841 census transcription shows she was born in England she was born in Whitburn around 1811. Agnes became a milliner in Stirling, and it was here she gave birth to her daughter Mary, who was nine-years-old on the 1841 census. The pair resided at 19 Baker Street, Stirling with an apprentice milliner and a servant also in the household.

DAVID PATON

Nothing is known about this person and in the records we can obtain, he was never shown living with Agnes.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

Agnes's marriage to David Paton, the father of her child, is not located, and the baptism of their only child shows she was baptised as Mary Black Paton, but neither Agnes nor Mary used the surname Paton on any census records.

By 1861, Mary too had given birth to a child with no sign of a husband. Joseph Fleming's father was identified as James Fleming on his birth certificate, but he was listed as illegitimate. Mary's name was given as Mary Black Patton on Joseph's birth certificate. Also living in the house was Charles Banks, the son of Agnes's youngest sister Janet. Janet was going through a difficult patch in Edinburgh during this time.

In 1871, with both parents dead, Margaret, the eldest daughter was the head of house and she was also employed as a daily governess. Of the thirteen children, most died before they were 30 and we can confirm marriages for only two. The cause of death recorded in the cemetery registers was generally consumption.

Robert was an architect so is well documented.

There is no record of his training but his early work, particularly the Bank in Stirling, is very close in style to the later work of David Hamilton. As he named his youngest son Hamilton just after that architect's death, some association with him, whether as apprentice or assistant, can be inferred. Black commenced practice in Glasgow in the late 1820s. By 1838 he had become architect to the Union Bank. In 1843 he formed a partnership with James Salmon (born 1805), who had obtained an apprenticeship with John Brash and commenced practice in Glasgow, reputedly in a Trongate basement, c.1825. Black lost his Union Bank position to William Railton of Kilmarnock in 1852, and his partnership with Salmon was dissolved in or about the following year. Thereafter Black entered a short-lived partnership with civil engineer Alexander George Thomson. Black remained in practice until his death from paralysis and bronchial problems on 6 December 1869 at 116 Sauchiehall Street which was both house and office. He was buried at Glasgow Necropolis, Omega lair

17. His wife Violet Woodrow had predeceased him on 24 February 1852, aged 40. They had six children, Violet, John who emigrated to Australia, Janet (usually known as Jessie), Robert who died aged 1 year, Robert (named after his deceased sibling) and Hamilton who died 9 November 1919. 'The Architect's Engineer's and Building Trades Directory' (1868) recorded him as having designed 'upwards of twenty churches', of which only six have been identified.⁶



Importantly, Robert in 1840, designed the Longridge Church; the place of worship of so many of his cousins. The spire (later removed) was reportedly exceedingly high. The building is now a private home.

In 1861, Robert was residing in the North Prison in Glasgow; he was described as a debtor with the occupation of architect. His birth place was given as Shotts and he was 57. Robert died on 6 December 1869.



John then entered a partnership with Richard Bell.



In 1832 Richard Bell began a match business in London which in one form or another, and in one country or another, still flourishes to this day. It was most likely his matches the pioneers brought with them in the 1840s and it was his matches they largely carried on using all the way through,

along with one or two other brands. Richard Bell had a partner in the earlier years and the resulting Bell and Black boxes represent 13% of all matches imported between 1870 and 1894 when New Zealand's own match industry was set up. After about 1880 the use of the name "Black" was found to be discontinued and the inscription on the match box lids then read simply "R Bell and Co. London."



James's birth was found in Shotts in 1810.

Elizabeth second marriage was in in 1859 to James Dunlop, a spirit merchant. In 1861 she was living in Glasgow with her new husband and her daughter Agnes Miller. In 1871, Elizabeth was a visitor in the home of her sister Mary Reid. In 1881, She was probably the lady's nurse in Glasgow.

William Pate/Peat shows on the census to be slightly younger but that's because Agnes seems to show herself as older than she was on these documents. He appears to have been born around 1812 in Shotts also. His likely parents were John Pate and Mary McArthur. There is a Pate's Hill south of Addiewell which may be connected to his family.

MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN

Agnes and William married on 16 March 1834 in Shotts when they were around the age of eighteen. Their first child was born before they married and baptised before the nuptials. There was a 24-year span between their eldest and youngest child. The children in later life used Peat despite being registered as Pate.

They were living at 8 Bute Place, Ardrossan; Hugh was a carpenter employing five others. We wonder if Mary told Hugh she was younger than what she was, as she lowered her age on subsequent census records. Five children were located.







MORTEN Wilhelmina Milroy of Gothic-house Petersham-road Richmond Surrey widow died 30 August 1907 Probate London 11 November to George Arthur Drought Goslett gentleman Effects £2146 2s. 10d.

Her daughter Violet Honnor Morten was a remarkable young woman who never married, and her story is told below.

Morten, (Violet) Honnor (1861–1913), nurse and journalist, was born at Mayfield House, Cheam, Surrey, on 13 November 1861, the only daughter among the four children of John Garrett Morten (1833–1900), a wealthy solicitor, and his second wife, Wilhelmina Milroy, née Black (1837–1907). She was a niece of the novelist William Black. She had two half-siblings by her father's first marriage. As a child she enjoyed playing billiards with Herbert Spencer, a family friend. She reached adulthood in 'an old Stuart palace', Ivy Hall, Richmond, Surrey, but eventually rejected the life of 'a fine lady with nothing to do but pay great attention to dress, fashion, and society' (Friedrichs, 304)

Aged twenty, Morten began nurse's training at the London Hospital under Eva Lückes, practised as a volunteer from 1885 to 1888, and came to accept nursing as her central calling. She gained the midwifery diploma of the London Obstetrical Society. In 1895 she began a course in scientific hygiene at Bedford College, London, and qualified for the certificate in 1896; her highest mark was her physics paper, reflecting her study of astronomical physics just after leaving school. In her later Who's Who entry she listed only astronomy and socialism as her recreations. A steady schedule of journalism, speaking, and international travel characterized Morten's life. She contributed to The Hospital, Daily News, and other periodicals. She also published several classic nursing manuals: her Nurse's Dictionary of Medical Terms and Nursing Treatment (1891) reached an eighth edition by the time of her death. In 1889 she founded the Women Writers' Club with offices in Fleet Street. In the early 1890s she founded a nurses' co-operative and the Association of Asylum Workers. About this time she began to lecture widely on infant care, first aid, family health, and women's rights. Her audiences ranged from Women's Cooperative Guild chapters to the London Ethical Society, and even women prisoners at Wormwood Scrubs—prison reform being another of her causes. About 1896 Morten took up residence in the inner London district of Hoxton. Here she and two college friends established a small settlement along 'unsectarian and socialist lines'. The settlers, both male and female, lived like their neighbours, and kept house for themselves. In her autobiographical From a Nurse's Notebook (1899) she exulted at the local curate's terror of her Chianti, cigarettes, and unorthodox religious views. During these Hoxton years Morten stood, in 1897, for election to the London school board, a powerful body responsible for educating about 660,000 pupils and employing 15,000 teachers. Only twenty-nine women (of a total membership of 326) served on the board during its existence from 1871 to 1903. She came in first among the candidates in her district of Hackney but wisely switched to represent the City when one of her constituents spotted her publicly smoking and raised an outcry. On the school board she advanced radical positions: equal pay for women employees, school nurses in the poorest schools, and better facilities for retarded children. She founded the School Nurses' Society to provide free nursing care for London children. Morten's vigorous campaign to abolish corporal punishment in the schools earned her adverse coverage in teachers' publications.

About 1905 Morten established Oakdene, a Tolstoy-inspired settlement in Rotherfield, Sussex, which was partly funded by donations from Aylmer and Louise Maude, the English translators of Tolstoy's Resurrection. According to a friend the house followed a rule that 'insisted on silence at the breakfast table—on the principle

that people are never amiable at breakfast' (Porritt, 136). The settlement was both a country holiday home for disabled children from inner London, each of whom was cared for by an adult settler, and a retreat for adults.

Like others of her generation devoted to serving the poor Morten caught 'the St. Francis spirit' in the 1890s (Porritt, 135). Her religious faith was that of a high-church 'firm Protestant', but she was rather secretive about it. She started writing a life of the Catholic martyr Edward Colman and published anonymously a 'little devotional book' entitled The Enclosed Nun, only revealing its authorship in a later book on St Francis's friend and disciple, St Clare (1912).

Morten, 'militant in spirit' (Votes for Women, 18 July 1913, 621), was a non-militant suffragist. She protested against the disenfranchisement of women by refusing to pay taxes, suffering instead the confiscation and public auctioning of some of her property. According to her friend the journalist Arthur Porritt, Morten submitted to more than one of these auctions in the months just before her death, of throat cancer, at Oakdene on 11 July 1913.

WILLIAM BLACK, AUGUSTUS WENZEL AND EVELINE WALDEN SIMPSON

Residence - London, England Brighton, England

The most notable of his family of sons and daughters was **William**, who, after beginning his literary career on the staff of the *Glasgow Evening Citizen*, migrated to London, and, as journalist and author of many novels, gained an immortal name as an exponent of Scottish life and scenery.

WILLIAM BLACK



William was the famous author mentioned in *Melodies and Memories* and was also the subject of a biography by Wemyss Reid. As a whole tome has been written about him we need only summarise a few details here. William was born in Glasgow in 1841. He started work as a bookbinder before becoming a fulltime writer.

AUGUSTE CHARLOTTE WENZEL

Auguste was born in Heidelberg, Germany on the 13 December 1842. Her father was Martin Wenzel and her mother Louise Sons.

William and Auguste married in England in 1865 but sadly Auguste died soon after childbirth at the age of 23.

In 1881, William's wife and children were staying with his best friend John Garrett Morten. Morten had married William's sister on the death of his first wife (who was also a member of the Black family). This census record was shown on a previous page. William wrote a book entitled *Madcap Violet* in 1775. The heroine may have been named after his niece and the following year he named his own daughter Violet. William was residing in Scotland in both 1881 and 1891, and in the later year, John Garret Morton was in the house also.

William died on 10 December 1898 and Eveline died on 14 February 1912. Both are buried in St Margaret's Churchyard, Rottingdean.

THE WILLIAM BLACK MEMORIAL BEACON.

The 'William Black Memorial Beacon,' which has been erected on the eastern coast of Mull, was lighted on May 12th, and on that night shone over the Highland seas for the first time. The following is a copy of the telegram which was sent by Mrs Black to all the members of the Committee:—"William Black Memorial Beacon. Lit to-day at three p.m. Thank you.—Black." There was no ceremony, but the following lines, entitled, 'The Silence AH," were written for the occasion by Lord Archibald Campbell, and dedicated to the daughters of William Black:—"Here mid the splendour of the dying day, We consecrate this Light in. Love's own way, In silence all.

"It is in silence that the day is born; It is in silence that the day—well worn—. Sinks into night. I'st not in silence that deep love is born? It is in silence that deep grief is born- In silence all."

An article in the Christchurch *Press* (NZ) heralded the erection of a memorial to William Black. With a number of relations in New Zealand we wonder how many realised they were reading about a Black from the Breich Water

Wikipedia has the following entry;

William was born to James Black and his second wife Caroline Conning. He was educated to be a landscape painter, a training that influenced his literary life, and as a writer he became celebrated for the detailed and atmospheric descriptions of landscapes and seascapes in novels such as White Wings: A Yachting Romance (1880).

At the age of twenty-three he went to London, after some experience with Glasgow journalism, and joined the staff of The Morning Star, and, later, the Daily News, of

which journal he became assistant-editor. He wrote a weekly serial in "The Graphic". During the Austro-Prussian War he acted as a war correspondent.

His first novel, James Merle, appeared in 1864, and had little success. Black later disowned the novel and reputedly bought copies to destroy them. Two further early novels Love or Marriage (1868) and The Monarch of Mincing Lane (1871) did little to advance his career, and all three were omitted from the collected edition of Black's works issued by the publishing firm Sampson Low from 1892.

It was the publication of A Daughter of Heth in 1871 that at once established his popularity. It is the story of a young girl brought up in Catholic France, who comes to live with her more austere Protestant relatives in southern Scotland, and ends with personal tragedy. The travel story The Strange Adventures of a Phaeton followed in 1872, and in 1874 A Princess of Thule was another big success and was later adapted into a musical play, The Maid of Arran, by a young L. Frank Baum.

Retiring from journalism the next year he devoted himself entirely to fiction. Several collections of short stories and a further 22 novels followed; the last – Wild Eelin – in 1898, just before his death on 10 December of that year.

During his own lifetime Black's novels were immensely popular, and were compared favourably with those of Anthony Trollope, though some critics complained that his writings revealed too much his interest in hunting and fishing. However, his fame and popularity did not survive long into the twentieth century. His works were bootlegged in the United States, not being protected by copyright laws. He teamed with such well-known authors as Rudyard Kipling, Thomas Hardy, and Walter Besant to abolish this procedure, resulting in the passing of new laws in 1891, but unlike the others, he held no grudge against those who sold unauthorized copies of his books while it was legal to do so, which made relations easier and friendlier between him and his American publishers. Baum's play was written without regard to copyright courtesy when such was legal: it is uncertain if Black was even aware of its existence, as Reid never mentions it in his biography.

Among his later novels may be mentioned two further "tragic" tales: Madcap Violet (1876) and Macleod of Dare (1879); Sunrise (1881) a novel of international political intrigue; Shandon Bells (1883) largely set in Ireland; Yolande (1883) which in part deals with drug addiction; Judith Shakespeare (1884) a historical novel featuring the playwright's daughter; and The New Prince Fortunatus (1890) a novel of London theatrical life. Friendship with actor Mary Anderson resulted in him stage acting twice, with mute roles known as "thinkers" (in Romeo and Juliet and The Winter's Tale), but his nervousness interrupted the performance.

Black also produced the volume Goldsmith (1878) for Morley's English Men of Letters series.

Black is remembered by a lighthouse built in the form of a Gothic tower "on a spot that he knew and loved, by his friends and admirers from all over the world," as recorded on a carved plaque over the door. The building was erected in 1901 and is still in use as a lighthouse. It stands a mile or so south of Duart Castle, at the eastern extremity of the Isle of Mull.

A collection of sketch-stories, including portions of the suppressed James Merle were published posthumously as With the Eyes of Youth, and Other Sketches (1903).

Family

Black's first wife, Augustus Wenzel, died on 14 May 1866 of a fever contracted not long after the birth of their son, Martin. They had only been married since 8 April 1865. Martin would die on 29 March 1871.

He first met his second wife, Eva Simpson, daughter of Wharton Simpson, a fellow journalist and fellow member of Whitefriars Club, in 1869. He saw her again in 1872 and used her as the basis for Bell in The Phaeton. They were married in April 1874 and she was still alive when Wemyss Reid, who had offered Black a contributor's role on the Leeds Mercury, published his biography. From 1879 until his death he lived at 1 Paston Place, Brighton.

Robert went long ago to Arkansas, served in the civil war, and has filled many public offices. He had many sons and daughters.

ROBERT BLACK

Robert was born on 24 July 1842 according to an American census record. He was found on the 1851 census in Scotland but left when he was thirteen for America. We are told his Uncle Robert Black offered an opportunity to one of his nephews, and it was young Robert who put up his hand to go. The two didn't know each other in Scotland as his uncle had left for America before young Robert was born. The date of 1855 was confirmed on his naturalisation application and an 1855 Wisconsin State Census for Lisbon, Waukesha, Wisconsin, indicates that Robert was by then living with his uncle and his wife. He remained with the couple until at least 1865 and was recorded in their household on the 1860 census. Robert enrolled in the 48th Wisconsin Infantry at Lisbon on 14 February 1865 to fight for the Union. He was discharged on 19 February 1866 when Company B of the 48th Regiment was disbanded. Robert at this point was 24.



Although recorded as a farmer, Robert had masonry skills and he built a stone house for his family and helped build many of the downtown buildings in Pope. He also helped establish and build the Presbyterian Church and was a charter member of the local Masonic Lodge. Robert was able to go back to Scotland to visit his family twice: once with Thomas, 16 July 1910, and again in May 1913 with oldest son William.

DEATH AND BURIAL



Robert and Sarah later moved to Oklahoma where Sarah died in 1916, Robert died on 27 October 1923. His headstone was paid for by the military and his daughter Fannie applied for it to be erected.⁹





HENRY BRYCE (HARRY) BLACK

William, the eldest, had nine sons ...[Henry]...several of the former being railwaymen.

Harry was born in 1889 in East Calder. By 1901 he was living with his six siblings and his widowed mother in Govanhill, Glasgow. Private 10008 enlisted with the National Scots Guards, on 1 September 1914 aged 25 and was reported missing after the fighting on 25 January 1915 at the Battle of la Bassee, France. He is commemorated on Le Touret Memorial and is listed simply as Harry Black. He is also commemorated on his parent's headstone, shown earlier in this document.

ARNOT HEPBURN BLACK

William, the eldest, had nine sons ...[Arnot]...several of the former being railwaymen.

Arnot was the youngest of the fourteen children and born in 1893 in Mid Calder. After Harry was killed in France, Arnot enlisted on the 27 September 1916 at the age of 22 from Glasgow. He was a shipping clerk and joined the Royal Scots Fusiliers in the 8th Battalion. Arnot died on 19 September 1918 at the age of 26. He is commemorated as simply 'A. Black' on the Dorian Memorial in Greece and also on his parent's headstone in Rosyth.

Note: William Black and Isabella Miller had fourteen children. Only five have been outlined here. Four of the girls did not marry and we currently know very little about the others.






Passenger list – Fushimi Maru 1917.

Three years after arriving in China Jeanie died after an operation on 4 June 1920 at Shanghai. She was 41.

Agnes was born in Scotland in 1883. Little is known about her short life.

The couple married in 1909 in Aberdeen.



Agnes died in February 1914 and Thomas enlisted after her death. He was given the rank of Captain in the Sherwood Foresters regiment. He was killed at Gallipoli on 9 August 1915.

'Black's body may also have had to be abandoned in the action after his death as the battalion withdrew and consolidated its position, and as no record of his burial survives he is today commemorated at Gallipoli on the Memorial at Helles. He is remembered too on the Nottingham University war memorial, the Durham

University Roll of Service, and in the windows and plaque to the fallen in Ferryhill parish church (formerly Ferryhill United Free church), Aberdeen. Nottingham University also established a research scholarship in his name, 10
